



## Junyi Graduate's Presentation: Inspiring Self-exploration




## The Alliance Cultural Foundation: Taiwan Connection

From 30<sup>th</sup> August to 1<sup>st</sup> September, Taiwan Connection (TC) performed three concerts at Kaohsiung, Taichung and Taipei. For the first time in TC history, the chamber orchestra invited international Principals to lead the horn, cello, flute and bass.

The conductorless orchestra challenged themselves with three pieces. The orchestra's young musicians opened each event with Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's Divertimento in D Major, K. 136, followed by musicians performing Felix Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto in E Minor, Op. 64 with TC Co-founder and Director Hu Naiyuan performing a solo; and concluding with Johannes Brahms's Symphony No. 2 in D Major, Op. 73.

It was Andrew Bain, renowned Principal Horn of the Los Angeles Philharmonic's, first visit to Taiwan; he said, "The level of playing is incredibly high, and then the collegiality within the colleague is wonderful. Everyone is wanting to produce the best result, work together, and share ideas. I think it is a perfect way to make music."





## Junyi School of Innovation: Encouraging Internships

Since 2015, every summer and winter school holiday, Teacher Lan Weiying conducts a Train the Trainer Workshop at the Junyi School of Innovation available to educators island-wide. From 12<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> August at Junyi's Wonderland Performing Arts Center, a total of 140 grades 1 to 12 teachers came together to co-design a curriculum learning roadmap as well as co-create thought provoking questions to ask in class.
